SHORT COURSE CREST: Cultural Respect Encompassing Simulation Training

Using simulation to address the need for culturally sensitive communication training in health care and health education

21 November 2014

Health care practitioners are seeing an increasingly diverse range of patients including migrant, refugee and Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people. Culturally sensitive health care is critical to reducing the inequities in quality of care for culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) patients, yet there are limited opportunities and resources for cultural sensitivity communication training. Using simulated patients, CREST can address this gap.

AIMS OF THIS SHORT COURSE

- To explore the importance of cultural respect to enhance an Indigenous patient's desire and ability to seek health care.
- > To explore the principles, skills and resources required for effective communication with linguistically diverse patients.

POTENTIAL PARTICIPANTS

This course will be of interest to health professional students, health course convenors, practising health professionals and their practice teams, and primary care support networks.

PROGRAM

The short course will provide an opportunity to workshop a range of frameworks for communication with Indigenous and CALD simulated patients, practise using communication tools and participate in exercises with simulated patients.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

On completion, participants will be able to:

- summarise the national Closing the Gap health initiatives for Indigenous Australians and explain the importance of cultural respect for Indigenous patients;
- explain the principles of effective communication with linguistically diverse patients and identify strategies to work effectively with an interpreter; and
- > use the Kleinman's explanatory model and the cross cultural negotiation framework to influence decision-making.

- > Effective communication when English proficiency is low*
- > Communicating culturally sensitive issues
