Research on information seeking and learning during 25 years: challenges, lessons and prospects

Join the School of Media, Culture and Creative Arts for a special lecture with Eminent Visiting Fellow, Senior Professor Louise Limberg

The lecture

Professor Limberg will present overall findings from a number of research projects carried out in Swedish primary and secondary schools during the last 25 years. The research has been directed at the interaction between information seeking and learning, linked to issues of information literacy. Main conclusions are that variation in the quality of students' information seeking and use interacts closely with variation in the quality of their learning outcomes, indicating that information literacy is a critical feature of learning via digital tools and information sources. The lecture will summarise these conclusions and discuss further research that is required.

Her research has created a lively interest among practitioners in librarianship and education across Scandinavia.
